As you prepare for camp in the coming weeks, we would like to take this opportunity to review our camp dress code policies for both Males & Females Tzevet.

At Moshava, we strive to create an atmosphere that is wholesome, respectful, and comfortable for all campers and staff. We aim to foster an environment in which clothing does not become a source of distraction, discomfort, or social division. The way we dress contributes meaningfully to the culture and environment of camp and the atmosphere we hope to create. We are committed to maintaining standards that reflect our Torah values and community expectations.

Below is the dress code for camp:

MALES

- Kippot (or hats) must be worn at all times.
- Tzitzit are required when not playing sports or swimming.
- Shirts with sleeves must be worn at all times; tank tops and sleeveless shirts are not permitted.
- No short shorts.

Shabbat Attire:

Friday Night: a solid white collared shirt (including polos) and dark pants.

Shabbat Day: White collared shirts (polos) with khaki or dark pants are permitted. Jeans may not be worn on Shabbat. Shabbat shorts may be permitted during the day depending on weather conditions.

FEMALES

- Skirts and shorts must reach the top of the knee. Tennis skirts and short shorts are not permitted and therefore should not be brought to camp.
- Sleeves must fully cover the underarm area, even when arms are raised. Cap sleeves are not permitted. Shirts must cover the shoulders and midriff and may not be tight or see-through. Clothing should not reveal cleavage at any time.
- Biker shorts, leggings, yoga pants, tight jeans, or other form-fitting pants may only be worn underneath another camp-appropriate attire.
- Only one-piece or tankini bathing suits are permitted. Bikinis are not allowed.

Shabbat Attire:

Friday Night: White shirts and blue or black skirts must be worn. Jean skirts are not permitted on Shabbat.

Shabbat Day: Campers may wear any colors, provided attire remains appropriate for Shabbat.

ALL TZEVEH

- Clothing with inappropriate language or messaging is not permitted.
- Shorts, pants, or skirts with writing across the back may not be worn.

Our goal in maintaining these standards is to help create an environment where everyone can focus on friendship, growth, fun, and meaningful experiences - without clothing becoming a source of distraction or discomfort for themselves or others.
